PURPOSE:

This is a display class exhibit on the League of Nations and its role in supporting efforts to aid refugees following World War One and the residual hostilities that affected millions in Europe, Asia, and the Middle East.

ORGANIZATION:

The exhibit documents the work of the League of Nations High Commission for Refugees from its inception in 1922 through its demise in 1938. Official service covers from the organization, including it's regional and affiliate offices, are presented in a chronological manner to document the activities of the organization during its existence.

IMPORTANCE

The League of Nations is considered the first truly international civil service organization, and the first such entity to use its own postage stamps. It was born out of the ashes of WWI by those international Statesmen that, having lived through the horrors of war, were committed to form a union that would foster international cooperation. One of the greatest successes of the organization was the support it provided for the repatriation and resettlement of millions following WWI. This exhibit documents the most significant activities of the League Refugee Organization.

KNOWLEDGE AND PERSONAL STUDY

This exhibit was first conceived in 2014 when I was fortunate to acquire some outstanding material from the estate of Richard "Dick" Powers. Dick had been a good friend and long time editor of our club publication, "The Journal of the United Nations Philatelists," and had written extensively on the subject of League and UN Refugee history. Given the acquisition of Dick's material, I began to assemble my League postal history collection in earnest, and recognized I had a significant amount of League material that could form the basis of an excellent single frame exhibit that truly could tell the story of the plight of the refugees. The exhibit represents a significant amount of personal study on the history of the League and the refugee situation in Europe and the Middle East following WWI.

CONDITION and RARITY

This exhibit is comprised of arguably the largest single collection of League of Nations refugee organization service mail in existence. This collector has spent nearly 40 years acquiring, studying, and documenting League of Nations postal history. As an officer in the United Nations Philatelists for several decades, I have befriended and corresponded with almost all of the influential philatelists worldwide with interest in the League of Nations. The material presented in this exhibit has been extraordinarily difficult to acquire as very few specimens of League service mail from the Refugee Offices have survived to enter the philatelic marketplace. In many cases, these covers are the only known examples recorded. Extremely scarce items are identified by a Blue Border in the exhibit.
