United Nations Collectors of Chicagoland, a chapter of UNP, participated with eleven other Chicago area clubs in the annual COMPEX '86, held over Labor Day weekend, a change from the normal Memorial Day weekend necessitated by AMERIPEX. Charles Berg, UNP's treasurer, was President of COMPEX this year. UNPA clerk Carmencita "Benjy" Dizon represented UNPA at the COMPEX banquet, presenting a speech and complimentary souvenir folders.

The theme of COMPEX was "Honoring America's Space Achievements", and UNCC's 13th annual souvenir card (for details, write UNCC, Box 1674, Chicago, IL 60690) followed that theme, depicting a first day cover of the UN issue on Peaceful Uses of Outer Space.

UNCC also sponsored 28 frames of UN related exhibits. In addition to two frames of WFUNA cachets and art reproductions, exhibitors Charles Berg, Harry Collier, Rudolf Waldukat, Curt Clemmer, Blanton Clement, Jr., and Benjamin Cohen presented a wide range of non-competitive UN and UN-related exhibits.

Journal.



The UN Penny Post

After much bouncing up and down over the course of the preceding thirty years or so, the U.S. domestic postcard rate stood at 1c on 24 October 1951. This magic date we all know as the first day of the initial segment of the First UN issue.

At that time another critical philatelic event was unfolding after making its formative way through the legislative process in the hallowed halls of Congress in Washington, DC. The much revered and equally hallowed "penny postcard" was about to become obsolete.

On 1 January 1952 a new domestic postcard rate, after much final deliberation, would be duly enacted into law and would take a gigantic leap upward and double, ..literally overnight. Amidst much controversy and public disdain, the new law was dutifully implemented by the Postmasters of America on New Years Day, 1952, at exactly 12:01 AM, 1 January 1952.

Since the UNPA was aware of this impending rate change, no one-cent postal card indicia was planned. This left this short nine-week period at the end of 1951 which no official pre-stamped card. As a result, UN #1 was the only available means of posting a card for domestic use at UN Headquarters.


Very few of these "UN Penny Postcards" survive to show 'lowly number one' in perhaps its most majestic light. Hence, here are three interesting examples that portray just that. (Editor's Note: The first of the examples is shown on the Journal cover.)




This card with an inverted stamp was cancelled 13 November 1951 and is also an official picture postcard. On the



reverse, it bears a black-and-white photo of the UN Interim Headquarters at Lake Success.

Postscript: It would not be until 18 July 1952 that the UNPA, to meet the needs of the new rate, would issue a 2c postal card with the familiar Leon Helguera design indicia similar to the 1-1/2c and 50c values of the First Regular Issue.

Printings of 7c Definitive

UN collectors interested in reprints of the later or "post-classical" definitives have Gaines to guide them to particular printings. It is a fact, however, that catalog descriptions must be terse. At times this can cause a problem. Short, clipped phrases, no matter how logically presented, are not the best method of communicating with every reader.

This article will attempt another approach at identifying the reprints of UNPA's only 7c definitive, #126.

First issued in 1964, #126 was reprinted four times before being withdrawn in 1976. There seems to have been no use for the denomination by this date, for it has never reappeared in a different design.

The stamp gave this writer a most difficult time before giving up its secrets. Variations in paper fluorescence at first were considered to be important hallmarks of the various printings. Eventually it became clear that such variations alone will not indicate different printings.

At this time it can be stated that even used specimens of \$126 can be assigned their proper printing. Mint copies, of course, make the task easier. Selvage blocks or strips are ideal to work with. A UV light can be of help, but is not absolutely necessary.

Stamps can be readily grouped into the first three or the final two printings. Observe the blue-to-white background of the stamp. On the first three printings the transition from blue to white is uneven. The white area is prominent, and the transition from blue to white appears to be rather abrupt and irregular at the same time. In contrast, the background of the final two printings is a very even and gradual change, progressing from dark blue to a very narrow band of white appearing just above the soil. There is no demarcation between blue and white on the final two printings.

Sorting out stamps from the first three printings is relatively easy. Mint specimens of the first printing are easiest to identify. They have a thick, glossy, yellowish gum; and this printing is the only one

appearing on paper that does not have gold flecks, seen in UV light.

The second printing is identified by the sharp point seen at the top of the plant. This point is lacking on the first and third printings. (It appears on the final two printings, against their characteristic backgrounds.) The gum is whiter and not as thick this time.

Even without gum the first and third printings are easy to distinguish. The UV lamp will note the gold flecks in specimens of 126.3. The collector is not handicapped, however, if specimens lack gum and no UV light is at hand. The gum of 126.3, it should be noted, is creamy but not as glossy as 126.1.

Observe the dark blue background. It appears darkest on the third printing, providing more contrast between the dark blue and the white on this printing than on any other. The dark blue also has a flatter or more matte appearance to it. Examine specimens under a single source of lower-wattage incandescent light, about 60 watts, tilting the stamp at various angles to the light. Glossy highlights on the paper and ink will be easily observed. More of these glossy spots will be seen in the dark blue of the first printing while few are found on the third. The gloss of 126.1 tends to make the ink appear a bit lighter in shade.

All three papers appear grayish or bluish-white in long-wave UV light. The paper is virtually non-fluorescent. Given what we know today about the process of paper production, it would not be surprising if specimens of any of the first three printings are found to have some fluorescence.

In short, then, look for a sharp point on the plant to identify 126.2. Look for a darker, flatter dark blue on 126.3.

Separating the last two printings is easiest with a UV lamp. The gum side of 126.4 will possess numerous bright fluorescent fibers. These are not seen, save for one or two perhaps, on 126.5. Differences will be noted in natural and artificial light as well. The paper of the fourth printing has a slight sheen when compared to all other printings. This sheen is best seen, in the writer's view, by studying the selvage paper in low-wattage incandescent light. Again, vary the angle of the paper to the light to detect this sheen.

Finally, observe closely, with a magnifying lens, the dark blue and the lighter blue just beneath the bottom edge of the plant leaves. One will see numerous, generally vertical, lines in the dark blue, producing a leather-like grain or texture. There seems to be more of this texture in 126.4 than in the final printing, giving the color a slightly darker shade. This subtle difference is best seen when comparing horizontal strips of stamps from the two printings, but it is detectable when viewing blocks of four. When examining the lighter blue background below the leaves, one will note a bias pattern of color circles on 126.5. This pattern is not seen on 126.4.

While the gum of both printings is considered clear or white, the gum of 126.5 appears a bit less glossy. It is also characterized by faint irregular cracks in it, called "crazing".

Given the data regarding texture, color dots, and fibers, it should not be too difficult to identify even used singles.

Both papers, incidentally, appear to have a faint reddish or bluish-red cast and are somewhat fluorescent in UV light. Now, wouldn't you agree that looking for the printing varieties of UNPA's 7c definitive is a bit more of a challenge than searching for the obvious, like cutouts and control numbers? There are financial rewards, too. Despite the scarcity of some of the reprints (most were used by the UNPA for postage, remember), they can be found in dealers' lots at bourses.

UNPA--Stamps vs. Meters

Rarely since the commencement of the UN Postal Agreement with the U.S. Postal authorities in 1951 have we seen UNPA official mail franked by meter. Off hand, I would say perhaps fewer than a dozen. The department prided itself on the use of its own postage stamps.

More recently there have been great pressures for austere financial management at the United Nations as well as at its agencies throughout the world. Though UNPA is a "profit-making" entity, it does supply funds for other UN expenditures, and of course, is subject to the same pressures as other departments. We all know that placing stamps on envelopes is a labor intensive job and that business and industry use a more efficient manner of handling mail - through the use of the postage meter. Nearly all, if not all, of the balance of UN originating mail is franked by meter, if not sent by POUCH with no postal markings. Hence we find the UNPA is a hold-out.


However, they now seem to be falling to pressure. Recent philatelic mailings have been metered as in the following illustration.

Yet, the UNPA Press Releases in their special envelopes are franked with postal adhesives. How long will it be before they, too, will succumb.




A Much Travelled UNEF Cover






Origin Cachets Used by UNESCO at Paris






Meter Notes

Organization of UNESCO

Instead of origin cachets, UNESCO service mail frequently has a typed or printed indicator of the sending department near the UNESCO corner card or as part of the address label. Frequently this is an obscure acronym or abbreviation. Fig.1 shows an organization chart of UNESCO which uses the same obscure indicators. Here is a start at "translating" some of these.



UNESCO-Paris Meter Notes

As we have seen since 1947, the UNESCO headquarters at Paris has had in service its own assigned meters for use on outgoing mail. However, covers exist with metered impressions of the local post office nearby. These impressions all carry the hour of posting. Exactly why this mail was not sent through normal channels is unknown. However, two possible explanations are:

- Mail of a personal nature not allowed in the official mail stream, or
- 2 The expectation that the mail may move more expeditiously if posted directly at the post office.

Regardless of the reason, these covers present interesting collateral items for the UNESCO meter collector. The following are illustrations of known meter uses.



Fig.1 Meter # PR 121 is the first known with use as early as 26 JUL 62. The latest reported use is 12 OCT 79. Note that the townmark reads PARIS 41.





Fig.3 The above two illustrations are those of the new computerized post office meters that the French Postal Administration has been experimenting with since 1980. It is not known when this branch first acquired this meter but the earliest known copy is dated 30 SEP 82 and it presumably is still in use. The letter "G" preceding the meter number stands for "guichet" which means 'position at post office counter'. Apparently the meter has been used at two positions, 1 and 2.

All post office impressions have been on white labels. However, it is reported that since last year a blue security paper is used. None has yet been reported at this branch office.

Similar post office metered covers are known from other postal branches, apparently the mail having been deposited in a branch more convenient to the mailer.



Fig.2 Meter # PR 674 impression differs from PR 121 in that the townmark has been changed to read 75-PARIS 41. The earliest reported date in 30 JAN 70 and the latest known date is 19 APR 82.
