

A SIMPLE PROPOSITION

I am interested in singles, pairs, blocks, M.I. blocks or the souvenir sheet itself. Please include the date of cancellation. I am only interested in dates no later than 1956. If at all possible, photocopies of the material would be ideal.

As this information comes in, I will tabulate it and any results of this census will be published in a later issue of the *Journal*.

UNITED NATIONS UPDATE (XIX)

"Shelter for the Homeless" and "Portrait of Hope"

The United Nations Office of Public Information has been preparing a film on the subject of homelessness with scenes from Brazil, Sri Lanka and New York City. In a previous column I mentioned the fact that as we approach U.N. Headquarters in New York, we invariably see a goodly number of homeless men and women lying on benches or on the sidewalks, some of them there by choice. According to an article in The New York Times of December 29th, the U.S. Mission to the United Nations voiced objections that the script of the film did not mention the basic American tenet of "individual rights". It is true that there are some homeless people who do not wish to be picked up and placed in shelters, preferring their way of life, say in the hallways of Grand Central Station. But that applies to a very small number of the homeless and it seems regrettable that a fuss was made about this, because as a result, the U.N. Office of Public Information, which is sensitive to reactions in this country and does not wish to antagonize Congress, decided to cut out the New York scenes altogether.

Fortunately, the stamps on this subject are not affected by this kind of politicking. In denominations of 22 and 44 cents, S.Fr. 0.50 and 0.90 and S.4.00 and 9.50, they all show scenes of building new houses in the country. The six stamps will be issued on March 13th, to coincide with Interpex in New York City.

In my view the six designs do not compare with those of some recent issues, when the UNPA really reached the realm of excellence. They are all the more disappointing because they are somewhat repetitive and do not really focus on the tragic plight of the homeless in the big cities. I cannot visualize how some of those unfortunate millions could be re-settled in the environment depicted on the stamps. The set is more a set of stamps on "housing" than anything else - and it is only in the countryside. Perhaps if the Stamp Design Committee had used the products if more than one artist, as it normally does, the subject would have been treated better. My main criticism is that the stamps do not seem to get the message across and that is what UN philately needs. The man in the street must come to realize in looking at UN stamps that the United Nations is really tackling the . main problem of our time.

The U.N. General Assembly, after discussing the problem of homelessness, recommended that there should be an International Year for the Shelter of the Homeless - 1987, when nations would apply them-

selves to try and solve some of the problems involved. There are two major objectives: 1) to achieve a measurable improvement in the living conditions of some of the world's poor; and 2) to improve, on a broader scale, the techniques for better living conditions. The two objectives are to be carried out in three phases, ending in the year 2000.

It is more than likely that a number of countries will issue stamps on the subject and we shall probably have another mini-omnibus series on our hands. But, let us admit that it is a topic that no one can shrug his shoulders about; it ought to interest a lot of people and, hopefully, cause some to start collecting U.N. stamps. I firmly believe that what we faithful U.N. collectors should aim at this year is to get new people interesting in collecting U.N. stamps.

One of the most satisfying actions of the UNPA this past year has been the release of a 22-minute film entitled "Portrait of Hope". It deals with refugees and shows how the Swiss artist Hans Erni went to Africa to get his inspiration for the scenes that he then depicted on the six stamps of the 1985 Refugee set. We see him pondering and sketching among babies crying in their mothers' arms, old men gazing at nothing and wondering: What next?, mothers asking themselves where the next bowl of rice or tumbler of milk for their children will come from. Those are scenes we are accustomed to see on our TV screens and in such telecasts as those of World Vision . We tend to get used to them. Yet Erni drew them with such skill that he enables us to grasp the idea behind his design. Then we see the designer discussing his artwork with René Gavard, the Chief of the UNPA in Geneva. The designs are approved, printed by Courvoisier S.A. at la Chaux-de-Fonds, a small Swiss town buried under snow in the Jura mountains. They are perforated, checked, crated and shipped to New York, Geneva and Vienna. The film ends at a reception at U.N. Headquarters on the occasion of the day of issue. Erni is there; he is asked to speak a few words. As he speaks against the background of enlargements of his creations, the film flashes back to the African scenes. Hans Erni's simple words: "I can now go back to my country, Switzerland; perhaps refugees will also, one day" ring out as a bell that continues to echo long after the film has ended. I saw the film at the Christmas meeting of the Allegany Stamp Club at Houghton, New York. I feel it is a must for all U.N. collectors to see and to get the clubs to which they belong to view it also.

UNESCO METERS

The past two years have been interesting ones for UNESCO meter activity. The usual new slogans at the beginning of the year was only part of the activity.

For some time UNESCO has had subordinate offices at other Paris locations. The post office location is noted in the townmark as "75 PARIS 15, Rue d'Alleray 15e" rather than the headquarters location of "75 PARIS 41, Av. de Saxe 7e". Without knowledge of what has been happening there, we base our conclusions on what is known philatelically. As long ago as February 1985, we noted the UNESCO office, Conseil International de la Musique (International Council of Music) using meters ND 6710 with another believed to be NA 43248, both with the "PARIS 15" townmark.

As early as July 4, 1985, we noted a shift of locations of two old-time meter machines, T-1473 and T-2544, from "PARIS 41" to "PARIS 15" (Fig. 1). Following that, in September 1985, a new machine T-87856 was introduced at the same location. Each of these machines was given the current International Youth Year (IYY) slogan. But when the new UN-ESCO 40th Anniversary slogan was introduced in March 1986, only one of these (T-87856) got a new slogan (Fig. 2). The other two meters retained the IYY slogan.

About the same time as this last addition at the "PARIS 15" office, the "PARIS 41" office acquired two new machines: T-94805 (with slogan) and T-94919 (without slogan). Meter T-92843 also continues there without a slogan. Why some machines rate slogans and others do not remains a mystery. The accompanying table shows in more detail the actual known usages of the various meters and slogans. Since the early part of the year is when UNESCO makes slogan changes, perhaps we shall be starting to see another such event soon.

INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF SHELTER FOR THE HOMELESS

UNPA Press Release

In 1982 the United Nations General Assembly designated 1987 as the International Year of Shelter for the Homeless (IYSH). The thrust behind the International Year is to secure renewed political commitment and effective action within and among nations to help the millions of poor all over the world to build or improve their shelters and neighborhoods and, by so doing, make it possible to integrate them into the process of economic development. Thus, the IYSH will highlight the co-ordinated world-wide effort to meet the basic shelter needs of the homeless throughout the world - pavement dwellers, those made homeless by natural and man-made disasters, the hundreds of millions who do not have access to safe water and sanitation, who do not have security of tenure and personal safety and because of their poverty are confined to live in slums and shanty towns, far from centers of employment, education and health.

Although adequate shelter has been universally recognized as a basic right for more than a quarter of a century, the over-all condition of shelter and basic services for more than one billion of the poor and disadvantaged in developing countries – and for a significant number in industrialized countries – is deteriorating alarmingly.

Today, approximately one quarter of the world's population does not have adequate shelter and lives in extremely unsanitary and unhealthy conditions.

In the past 24 hours, more than 50,000 people have died from malnutrition and disease, much of it linked to inadequate shelter, water supply and sanitation. Most of them children.

Approximately 100 million people have no shelter whatsoever. They sleep in the streets, under bridges, in vacant lots and doorways.

In Latin America, it is estimated that 20 million children and youth live and sleep in the streets.

In many squatter settlements, it is not uncommon for more than 1000 people to be dependent on water from a single stand-pipe. Up to 90% of the inhabitants may have no access to human waste disposal facilities.

By the year 2000, if present trends continue:

- a) World population will increase by approximately one and one-half billion; more than three-quarters of that increase 1.2 billion people will be added to urban populations in little more than fifteen years.
 - b) In the developing countries, the percentage of

the population living in urban areas will rise from 28% (1975) to 44%. This signifies a growth from 830 million to 2.15 billion.

- c) In Africa the urban population will more than double from 160 million to 350 million.
- d) In Latin America 75% of the population, 455 million, will live in cities.

Today, homelessness is a world-wide problem. Despite improvements in general housing standards over recent decades, few governments can claim to have national policies that effectively meet the shelter and related needs of their people – especially those of the poor.

Nevertheless, because of the IYSH, 363 projects around the world have been established to assist the homeless population. Of this total, 124 projects are in Africa, 96 in Asia and the Pacific, 54 in Latin America and the Caribbean and 16 in the Middle East. Developed countries have designated 70 IYSH projects, some of them through their international aid departments. Canada, for example, has projects in 21 countries in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean. The United States, through its Agency for International Development has registered 12 housing projects in three continents. The Governments of France, Denmark, Australia, Finland, Norway, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom also have projects.

The principal UN unit concerned is the United Nations Center for Human Settlements (UNHCS), also known as Habitat with headquarters in Nairobi, Kenya. The necessary co-ordination expenditures made by the UNHCS on behalf of the IYSH have come from voluntary contributions by governments.

Habitat Meter

The North American Office of the UNCHS or Habitat is located in Vancouver, British Columbia in Canada. Thanks to Jack Mayer, we are able to document it postally with the meter cancel dated December 14, 1984 shown below. It is interesting to note that already in 1984 the meter slogan anticipates the IYSH by showing its logo.

Shelter for the Homeless Commemoratives

On March 13, 1987 the UNPA issued a set of six commemoratives elaborating on the theme "Shelter for the Homeless". The designs of the stamps illustrate the different phases of the establishment of a settlement in a rural area from the planning stages to the housewarming. The New York issues show people surveying and studying blue-prints (22 cents) and men cutting lumber (44 cents). The Geneva issues show brick-layers and cement-mixers in action (F.S. 0.50) and interior decorators and installers at work (F.S. 0.90). The Vienna stamps depict one family looking at the newly-built community (S 4) and another one entering their new home (S 9.50). The stamps are shown on the back cover of this journal.

The designers of the three first day cancels have all incorporated the symbol of the IYSH, which depicts a man standing in front of a stylized A-frame shelter, into the design of the cancellations, which are shown below.

These stamps are also featured in the design of the souvenir card issued on this day, the thirty-first in the series.

More Minature Sheets Promised

In the most recent bulletin of the UNPA in Vienna is an announcement that the United Nations Day stamps to be released on October 23rd will be issued in minature sheets of twelve. The horizontally formatted stamps will be arranged in three rows of four stamps each. The three lower denominations (22 cents, F.S. 0.50 and S 5) all feature groups of young people of various nationalities in scenes near the UN headquarters in New York, Geneva and Vienna with appropriate views of the Hudson River, Lake Geneva and the Danube River respectively. The higher denominations (39 cents, F.S. 1.70 and S 6) show young people of various nationalities in native dress dancing. As usual the token American (or Canadian or Australian) is dressed like a cowboy.



"Africa in Crisis" Issue Not Withdrawn from Sale

Contrary to what was expected, the "Africa in Crisis" series was not withdrawn on January 30, 1987 but remains on sale in view of its special character. As mentioned on the occasion of the issue, the income produced by its sale is directly destined for the emergency situation in Africa. It is this particular objective, which led the United Nations to request that this series be kept on sale until further notice.

Recent Issues Withdrawn from Sale

March 13, 1987 was the last day of sale of the commemorative series "Development Program" issued on March 14, 1986. However, the stamps of this series will remain on sale during one more year in the 1986 souvenir folders.

The 18-cent definitive stamp issued in 1974 was removed from sale on December 2, 1986.



THE NEXT UPU CONGRESS - Washington, D.C. - 1989

By Richard Powers

In the course of the last Universal Postal Union (UPU) Congress in Hamburg, West Germany in 1984, it was announced that the USA would organize the following Congress, the twentieth in the series. It will be staged in Washington, D. C. at the Convention Center from November 13 until December 15, 1989.


To get an idea of the magnitude of this Congress, which takes place every five years, one need only recall that at the last meeting nearly one thousand delegates from among 166 member states registered.

Such meetings can affect the stamp collector in many ways. First there are the decisions taken, which affect the flow of international mail, such as tariffs, regulations governing the size and shapes and types of mailable objects, and allowed subject matters on stamps which see international postal duty.

In addition most host countries issue attractive stamps commemorating the presence of the UPU Congress within their borders. The West German Post Office issued in 1984 a very interesting souvenir sheet consisting of three stamps. The 120 pfennig stamp shows a portrait of Heinrich von Stephan (1831-1897), the Postmaster-General of the German Reich, who was one of the prime movers in the establishment of the UPU in 1874. To the left of Stephan's portrait is a 60 pfennig stamp, which depicts mail sorting in the good old days. To the right is a 80 pfen-

nig stamp, which shows elements of a modern mailsorting machine with an automatic address scanner. Fig. 1 shows a copy of the cover of a German Post Office presentation booklet containing a copy of this souvenir sheet (insert) cancelled in Bonn on the day of issue June 19, 1984, the second day of the Congress. These booklets were distributed to the attendees of the annual meeting of UNOP (the German-language UN Collectors Club) in November 1984 by a representative of the German Post Office.




Fig. 2 Two-cent envelope overprinted in honor of the fifth UPU Congress in Washington, D. C. in 1897

The last time that the United States hosted the Congress – in 1897 – the U.S. Post Office overprinted thirty-four of some of its most beautifully engraved stamps and twenty-two different items of postal stationery with the legend "Universal Postal Union". Fig. 2 shows such a 2-cent envelope. In my 1954 specialized Scott's United States Stamp catalogue this item is listed as having a value of \$3.00. Today at auction one would be lucky to walk away with a copy

What fascinates me the most though are the Congress-related cancellations, which are used for delegate mail during the Congress. In Fig. 3 is a delegate cover from the last Washington Congress dated June 10, 1897 and bearing a one-cent Columbian stamp cancelled with an extravagant flag cancel bearing the

legend "Congrès postal Universal". According to the Gaines Catalogue this machine cancel was used at a postal station open only to delegates and that the postage was affixed by the U.S.P.O.D. free of charge to delegates. The Gaines' estimated value for such a cover is \$300. I wonder what the value of such covers from the 1989 Congress will be worth in the year 2079.




