Clay's Cover Corner by Clay Wallace

In the December 1993, Hintermann auction, I had the opportunity to acquire two very important covers relating both to the 1946 U.N. London conference, and in general, to the 1945 U.N. London slogans. These two covers are shown in figures one and two below. You will note that no London slogan is shown, however, these two covers do fall in to the London slogan period of December 1, 1945 to January 19, 1946.

The Figure 1 cover is almost identical to the one exhibited by Blanton Clement, Jr. (a former UNP President) and depicted in my revision of the Barnes/Merriman/Wallace The London 1945 United Nations Slogan Cancellation book, on page 21. Only the angle on which the stamp is placed on the envelope betrays their difference. Obviously, these covers were produced by W. Frey (or a friend of his). Others may exist.



The cover shown in Figure 2 is also very interesting. It is on the same stationary as the Figure 1 (and its companion) cover, except that it is registered and has a London S.W.1.72 cancel also dated 17 JA(nuary) (19)46. The cover was properly backstamped 21.I.46 - 4 PM) Geneve 3 Rive upon its arrival in Switzerland.




Figure 3: The opening day.

On page 20 of The London 1945 United Nations Slogan Cancellation book I speculated on the meaning of the SW 30 cancel used on Hill cover (Figure 3) which is also registered and dated 10 JA(nuary) (19)46. Barnes covers these arguments in much more detail in his Britain, the League and the U.N. book. In an update in a Philatelic Bulletin (the journal of the UNSG), Bill Barnes points out that N. Hill was very likely a relative of a Mr. Hill, a British delegate to this U.N. Conference. Since this is a "first day cover" from the conference, it appears that all registered letters from this conference are in the 3000 series, and that both the SW30 and the SW72 hand cancelers were in the British post office (maybe with the S.W.1. 'C' machine) provided for delegates at the conference site. Together these items represent important philatelic evidence of a very early U.N. conference.



The Formation of U.N.R.R.A. in 1943 by Alex Bereson

The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation (UNRRA) organization was created by the Allied Powers to manage the daunting problem of caring for millions of refugees left destitute in the aftermath of WWII. It encompassed a logistical challenge of massive proportions regarding clothing, food, shelter, health care and repatriation of refugees throughout the globe. Philatelically, UNRRA left an interesting legacy of postal history from its far-flungfield operations.

On November 9, 1943, a year and a half before the surrender of Germany, 44 nations met in the White House to sign the agreement creating UNRRA. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt spoke on that occasion:

"All of the United Nations agree to cooperate and share in the work of UNRRA - each nation according to its own individual resources - and to provide relief and rehabilitation for the victims of German and Japanese barbarism..."

The signatories included Australia, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Egypt, El Salvador, Ethiopia, French Committee National Liberation, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Iceland, India, Iran, Iraq, Liberia, Luxembourg, Mexico, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Peru, the Philippines, Poland, the Union of South Africa, the USSR, the United Kingdom, the United States of America, Uruguay, Venezuela and Yugoslavia. Denmark, Byelorussian SSR, Ukrainian SSR and Turkey later joined the agreement.

Immediately upon liberation of any area, its population would receive aid in the form of food, clothing, shelter, health care. In addition, assistance was provided for restoration of essential services, resumption of agricultural

and industrial production and return of exiles to their homelands (or relocation to a third country).

A ruling council was created as the policy making body. It consisted of one representative of each member government. Two regional committees, one for Europe and one for the Far East, recommended policy in their respective regions.

A year before UNRRA's formation, President Roosevelt had appointed then New York Governor Herbert H. Lehman as Director of the Office of Foreign Relief and Rehabilitation (OFRRO). This agency organized American participation in relief activities that UNRRA superseded. Negotiations concerning the formation of UNRRA were under the auspices of the US Assistant Secretary of State, Dean Acheson. (The centenary of Acheson's birth was commemorated by US Scott #2755, issued in Washington, D.C., on April 21, 1993.)

The first session of UNRRA was held at the Claridge Hotel in Atlantic City, New Jersey (from November 1 - December 1, 1943), immediately following the signing of the agreement. Figure 1 illustrates an invitation to the Venezuelan delegate to the inaugural UNRRA session.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the Council of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration and the Department of State of the U. S. A. have conferred upon the City of Atlantic City the great honor and distinction of holding the historic conference of the Council in this City on November 10, 1943 and extending until concluded; and

WHEREAS, the day following the signing of the agreement creating the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration at the White House in Washington, the representatives of the United Nations will open the sessions of their conference in Atlantic City on November 10; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the delegates and their staffs, the City of Atlantic City will be host to the leading representatives of newspapers, news services, magazines, periodicals, newsreels, news photographers, radio commentators and announcers, and journalists from all parts of the world; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid conference will determine the fate of hundreds of millions of human beings in a war-torn world, by mobilizing the economic resources of all of the United Nations to alleviate and prevent starvation, disease and pestilence, and to provide shelter, refuge and repatriation to a suffering mankind; and

WHEREAS, the successful outcome of this conference, the greatest international co-operative effort of its kind in the history of the world, is being watched and prayed for by the entire human race, and even among the tortured people in enemy countries;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, THOMAS D. TAGGART, JR., Mayor of the City of Atlantic City, do hereby join the hands of the people of this City with the rest of mankind in the hope and prayer that the conference of the Council of the United Nations Relief

and Rehabilitation Administration will be crowned with the greatest success, to the relief and salvation of a distressed humanity; and

I DO FURTHER, on behalf of the citizens of this City, extend to the delegates, their staffs, the representatives of newspapers, news services, magazines, periodicals, news reels, news photographers, radio commentators, announcers, and Journalists covering this conference, as well as their families, friends, and guests, a most cordial welcome and the freedom of our City and our firesides; and

I DO FURTHER, on behalf of the City at large, designate the period from November 10, 1945 until concluded, as "UNITED NATIONS RELIEF AND REHABILITATION ADMINISTRATION TIME", to be so known and characterized by the people of this City, now and hereafter.

Given under my hand and seal, this ninth day of November, 1943, at Atlantic City, New Jersey,




Figure 4: Dean Acheson addressing the attendees.

Dean Acheson acted as the temporary chairman over the presiding until Herbert Lehman was formally appointed as Director General on November 11, 1943. Figures 3 and 4 are photographs of the opening session. The 44 nations sent 240 delegates (and alternates).

WORLD AIDS DAY

The World Health Organization, a specialized agency of the United Nations, proclaimed December 1, 1993 as World's AIDS Day. In honor of this special day, UN Secretary-General Boutros Boutros Ghali held a ceremony at UN headquarters in New York. Also, in Geneva, the Director-General of WHO, Dr. Hiroshi Nakajima, and the six Regional Directors from Brazzaville, Washington, Alexandria, Copenhagen, New Delhi and Manila held a ceremony and signed a declaration on AIDS.

On World AIDS Day, the US Postal Service issued a 29 cent stamp in sheet and booklet form with the notation "AIDS Awareness." These stamps had their official first day in New York on December 1, 1993.




Figure 1:UNHQ AIDS cover

I was in New York City the first week of December and visited the UN. The UNPA sales counter was offering (for \$1.00) a special cover, shown in Figure 1. The cover has the UN Headquarters cachet. It has the new US AIDS stamp cancelled first day in New York, and one of the 1990 UN stamps, "Fight AIDS Worldwide," cancelled with UNNY wreath cancel on December 1, 1993.




Figure 2:USPS AIDS slogan cancels

According to Linn's Postmark Pursuit columns from Nov. 20, 1993 to Jan. 3, 1994, special "World AIDS Day Station" postmarks were used at 105 different post offices on December 1, 1993. Figure 2 shows a selection of these postmarks. Most of the postmarks have the same basic format, but there are differences. One of these, from Luke, Missouri, is enclosed in a "box." Also, it appears that the ribbon on the Fairbanks, Alaska, postmark is filled in (solid). The Newark, New Jersey, postmark is completely different, and the Topeka, Kansas, postmark is a significant deviation from the standard format. Readers may wish to report to the Editor other observations of format changes in this UN-related postmark.

Military Mail Corner by J.L. Emmenegger

A new UN Forces airletter?

UN military mail collectors know four different official UN airletters, especially printed and distributed to UN soldiers and/or UN observers: a) UNEF I, b) UNOGIL, c) ONUC and d) UNEF II/UNDOF/UNIFIL, as well as other more recent operations.

The rarest one is clearly the United Nations Observers Group in Lebanon (UNOGIL) airletter, of which only ten copies are known in "used" condition (really mailed from Beirut). The reason these are so rare is that the UNOGIL airletters were printed locally in Beirut and given to the UNOGIL observers only a few days before the end of their operation.




Figure 1: Is this UNTAC airletter the fifth official UN airletter for UN forces?

Now, collectors have reported the existence of a special aerogramme used in Cambodia, for the United Nations Transitional Authority in Cambodia (UNTAC) operation. Based upon the information that an Italian journalist and UN military mail collectors have given us, it seems that a) this UNTAC airletter is an official one, printed in Phnom Penh, and that b) it was available only at certain camps, where the Canadian, Australian, Japanese and Polish contingents were located, as well as at the UN Base Post Office (UNBPO).

Besides this, we don't have any additional information! Should you have a used UNTAC airletter, we would appreciate receiving a photocopy. Please send it to: P.O. Box 110, CH-1009, PULLY, Switzerland.


UNMOSA - United Nations Observers Mission in South Africa

Mail from most of these UN operations has already been seen. Generally, the letters are sent via the civilian post offices. The only exception is the UNOMIG cover we received; it was sent by the Danish officer from home. He wrote: "No civilian post exists in Georgia, nor do we have UN Pouch Mail. We are in a civil war region."

We will return to these new missions mail. as well as the Laos Mission cover of our last article, in the next Military Mail Corner.




Figure 1: 2nd Printing postally used on cover

THE #38 SOUVENIR SHEET: POSTAL AND POST ISSUE USES by Don Bakos

On October 27, 1955, a United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) press release stated that there were more orders for the just issued tenth anniversary souvenir sheet than there were mint sheets on hand; and that consequently, an additional supply of the sold-out sheet would be secured in a limited quantity.

On November 16, 1955, a subsequent release announced that on Sunday, November 27, 1955, a limited supply of these sheets would be made available only at the UNPA sales counter. A later announcement went on to stipulate that this additional printing would amount to just 50,000 sheets.

Although the November 16 press release noted that the additional sheets would be available only at the UNPA sales counter, Figure 1 above, shows that as late as December 28, 1955, the UNPA was using the #38 to fill back orders and also to accommodate those collectors desiring that the sheet be used as return postage.




Figure 2: First Printing #38 souvenir sheet used to pay the half-ounce airmail rate to Germany in November, 1955

The first printing, it's supply exhausted after only one day of sale, also did postal duty as in seen in Figure 2; it's fifteen cents of value paying the half-ounce airmail rate to Germany.


Other enterprising collectors cut the individual stamps from the souvenir sheet and affixed them as imperforates, as shown in Figure 3.

There have always been an active interest in the #38. Perhaps ten years had seemed like such a long time what with the Korean Conflict coming so soon after the close of WWII.

Various philatelic groups have celebrated the sheet itself by featuring merely "so-so" to nearly identical replications of it on their showcards. Even Courvoisier S.A., the Swiss printer of the 25th Anniversary Souvenir Sheet, managed a commemorative miniature sheet (Figure 4) which it issued in conjunction with INTERPHIL '76 in a quantity of 100,000.




Figure 5: Large-size showcard issued in conjunction with INJUNPEX '74 in New York.




Figure 6: The STAMPEX '75 commemorative sheet was issued in a size nearly identical to the original of 1955.




Figure 7: An Artcraft FDC was featured on this 35th anniversary showcard from San Francisco.

E.T. and the United Nations by Alex Bereson

On February 4th, the UNPA released a stamp album for the young and young at heart, A Universal World of Stamps - E.T. and the United Nations The album was made possible through the support of Mr. Steven Spielberg, the acclaimed movie director, and Universal Studios. Please refer to the *Journal* front cover for illustrations from the album.

The foreword of the album features a photograph of Mr. Spielberg with E.T., and an introduction by Mr. Spielberg who writes: "... it is my pleasure to join my favorite alien, E.T., to welcome you to the fun world of stamp collecting." He continues: "my movies have reflected my strong commitment to all kinds of families. For this reason, I'm especially pleased to join E.T. and the UNOPA in producing this special stamp album celebrating the International Year of the Family."

The colorful album includes twelve United Nations stamps and a supply of hinges. It does not limit collecting to UN proper, but instead is designed thematically around sixteen topics to encompass world-wide collecting. The topics include: family, independence, health (WHO), food (FAO), education, elderly, immunization (UNICEF), clean water, environment, endangered species, technical assistance, communications, outer space, transportation, the United Nations and peace. The album is delightfully illustrated. The transportation theme, for example, depicts the famous moon silhouette of E.T. bicycling across the night sky.

HAMBURG 30th ANNIVERSARY CARD by Franklin M. Silverman

On June 26, 1975, while the United Nations was celebrating its thirtieth anniversary with stamps and souvenir sheets in New York and Geneva, the United Nations Association of the Federal Republic of Germany issued a souvenir card to commemorate the occasion in Hamburg.

There were one thousand cards printed and prepared for the show. Cards #101 to #500 were cancelled with the New York souvenir sheet (Scott #262) and the remaining half were cancelled in Geneva (Scott #G52). No mint cards were released. All the souvenir cards were personally signed, in blue ink, by K.H. Kern and J. Krause, even though their signatures look as if printed on the card.




Figure 1: New York Card




Figure 3: Sample Card

Recently, after fifteen years, a new variety of the card (Figure 3) was discovered! This card is cancelled with the Geneva souvenir sheet with the working day cancel (not the normal FD cancel), and it also has the rubber show imprint in the upper right hand corner. At the lower center of the card between where the two signatures should be, is (in red ink) the printed word "MUNSTER" in German ("SAMPLE").

Since no other "sample" cards have been found or reported in recent years, is this the only one? If you have one, or know of others, please contact the author c/o Linn's Stamp News.

UNTEA FIRST DAY COVERS by M. Hardjasudarma

Eleven of the UNTEA (United Nations Temporary Executive Authority) overprinted stamps of Netherlands New Guinea were issued on October 1, 1962. Eight more appeared on November 1, 1962, to make up the full set of 19 values.

It is generally believed that no official UNTEA stationary existed during the first few months of operations of this United Nations body. As a result, other stationary was used to create first day covers, such sa that of the former Netherlands New Guinea government, or the local philatelic association (Figure 1). No special cachets, official or otherwise, were produced, although it is of course possible for some enterprising or artistic person to later create them using otherwise blank envelopes.

Any "FDC" that has all 19 values together, or the 8 values issued in November but postmarked October 1, 1962, and all others on official UNTEA stationary, must therefore be considered as fabricated, using backdated cancellers. Genuine FDCs should be on blank, or non-UNTEA stationary, with the first 11 stamps cancelled October 1st, and the final eight, November 1, 1962 (Figure 1). As such, the set invariably consists of two FDCs.

In the quest for first day of issue evidence, commercially (that is, without philatelic intent) produced, it is always challenging to find such examples. This particular one (Figure 2) reveals that UNTEA stamps were indeed available in Sorong on October 1, 1962, and that there was no interruption in the transmission of foreign postal money orders.

Editor's note: Dr. Hardjasudarma is a wellknown UNTEA specialist. I am pleased to see him resume his UNTEA Corner articles and hope they will featured in the Journal regularly.

Mr. Hardjasudarma recommends a new publication, "De aantekenstrookjes gebruikt in (Nederlands) Nieuw-Guinea" - The Registration Labels used in (Netherlands) New Guinea, by N.J. de Weijer. The 104 page soft cover publication (in Dutch) is a well illustrated study of registration labels of Netherlands New Guinea (including the UNTEA period). 
