

MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR

Second Call for Thirtieth Anniversary Contributions

In the Message from the Editor on the first page of the October 2006 issue of the Journal, I issued a call for contributions to a proposed special issue on the occasion of the thirtieth anniversary of the first issue of the Journal in August 1977. This project was inspired by the very successful effort by UNOPhilatelie (UNOP), the German-based club of UN Stamp Collectors to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of their organization. Their 122-page "Festschrift" (Celebration Booklet) contained contributions from fifteen UNOP members. which varied in length from my two-page article When is the Birthday of the United Nations? to Walter Gill's 16-page article The Saar Region under League of Nations Administration. A complete list of the contributions to the UNOP Festschrift appears on page 1 of the October 2006 issue of the Journal.

My vision for our project is to create a booklet which introduces our club to other philatelists, whether actual or would-be. It would indicate what UN Philately means to us: what we collect and why. It need not be a scholarly treatise resulting from extensive research. In the February 2006 issue of the *Journal* (page 1), I offered suggestions on topics. These include such themes as:

Description of special collecting interests; Specialized items in my collection; My favorite UN-related item; Items that I would like to find; What inspired me to join UNP; Items that I would like to exhibit.

I called for contributions by December 31, 2006 so that I could start working on the project with an eventual publication date of August 2007. Thus far the response has been underwhelming.

It started out promisingly with a nice two-page contribution by Klaus Guhl on halfmast varieties of the UN first issue. He also sent me his privately-produced 200-page work on the UN First Issue, from which I intend to publish extracts in upcoming issues of the Journal.

Then I received an encouraging e-mail from a member, who supported the project enthusiastically but had run into a serious case of writer's block.

When I include my translation of the article I wrote in German for the UNOP Festschrift, we have a grand total of four pages in hand for the UNP project. Surely among our more than 220 members, there are more than two who are willing to share with others their interests. It is the goal of this project to increase the circle of UN philatelists by promulgating our enthusiasm for our collecting interests. I am looking forward to receiving your contributions within the next two months, so that I can begin working on the project when the spring semester ends in May 2007.

For those of you who have been inspired by these words to submit either an article for this project or an article or a Letter to Editor or a member ad to the *Journal*, I would like to offer a few guidelines on sending items to the Editor.

I gladly accept submissions in typed form by snail-mail. Illustrations should be in the form of good black-and-white photocopies. I do not want to handle original items.

For those of you who prefer to communicate by e-mail, here are a few guidelines.

I ask that the text of the contribution be separated from the figures. I prefer that the text be sent as an e-mail attachment in the form of an editable text file in rich text format (*.rtf). It can also be embedded in the body of the e-mail. Please do not send me text files written with WORD. My text editor is WORKS and is not capable of understanding WORD documents. I ask that figures be sent as separated e-mail attachments in *.jpg format, one for each figure.

In closing, I believe that a good club journal, is like a good chorus. It produces better results, when there is a broad variety of voices. Let's hear from those new pens and keyboards.


THE UNITED NATIONS ENDANGERED SPECIES SERIES

On March 16th of this year the United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) issued its fifteenth set of twelve stamps depicting endangered species. This stamp issue coincided with the Postage Stamp Mega-Event show in New York City. The purpose of these stamps is to publicize the work of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES), which was signed in Washington, D. C. on March 3, 1971. As of 1998 the convention had a membership of 139 nations. The Government of Switzerland serves as the depository of the Convention.

The aim of the Convention is to ensure that international commerce does not threaten the survival of species of wild animals and plants in recognition of the fact that unrestricted exploitation is the second major threat to the survival of some species, the first being the destruction of their habitat. For this purpose, species of wild animals and plants are listed in three appendices to the Convention. Appendix I concerns species where international trade is prohibited except under exceptional circumstances. Appendix II handles species where trade is controlled. Appendix III lists species where international trade is restricted from certain countries.

The 2006 Endangered Species



Mandrillus Leucophaeus: The drill is a large, short-tailed forest monkey. This endangered species has an extremely restricted range, from the Cross River in Nigeria to the Sanagra River in Cameroons and also on the southern tip of the island of Bioko, Equatorial Guinea. This endangered (Appendix I) species is under pressure from hunting and loss of its rainforest habitat.



Saimiri Sciureus: The common squirrel monkey lives in tropical rainforests of South America, except in the southeastern coastal forests of Brazil. It is up to 12.5 inches long (body length) with a tail of about 16 inches. This Appendix II species is endangered because of habitat destruction, illegal hunting and capture for the pet trade or medical research.



Lemur Catta: The ring-tailed lemur is endemic to south-central and south-west Madagascar. It inhabits dry brush and scrub, as well as closed canopy forest. It has a distinctive long and bushy black-and-white ringed tail. Recently the (Appendix I) ring-tailed lemur has suffered habitat loss due to fires, overgrazing by livestock, tree-cutting for charcoal production and the development of Madagascar.



Cercocebus Torquatus: The collared mangabeys are arboreal as well as terrestrial, but they mainly inhabit lower levels of the forests, especially in swamp forests. This Appendix II species is found in West Africa and distributed from Guinea to Gabon.



Theropithecus Gelada: The so-called Gelada Baboon is not a true baboon. It is the only member of its genus and the last surviving species of a once widespread group of grass-grazing primates. It is found only in the highlands of Ethiopia. Geladas sleep at night on rocky cliffs and outcrops. Habitat destruction due to Ethiopia's growing population puts this Appendix II species at risk.

Cercopithecus Neglectus: De Brazza's monkey is grey with black extremities and tail and is found in Central and East Africa in forests, swamps and seasonally flooded areas. They are arboreal, territorial and terrestrial. Threats to



this Appendix II species include pet traders, habitat destruction from deforestation, range fragmentation from increasing human populations and cultivation, mainly of coffee plantations in Ethiopia.



Varecia Variegata: The ruffed lemur, like all other lemurs, is endemic to the island of Madagascar. It is a forest dweller, getting around by walking or running on larger branches and leaping from tree to tree. All lemurs (Appendix I) are threatened by habitat loss through logging and development in Madagascar and are at risk due to hunting and the pet trade.

Hylobates Moloch: The silvery or Javan gibbon has long fluffy, silver-grey fur with darker markings on the chest and cap. It inhabits tropical lowland, hill and mountain rainforests between sea level and 1,500 meters on the western half of the island of Java, Indonesia. This (Appendix I) species has undergone dramatic decline in population primarily as a result



of habitat destruction (logging, agriculture and development).



Erythrocebus Patas: The patas monkey has a shaggy, reddish-colored coat and a grey-hound-like build. It has a wide distribution range across sub-Saharan Africa from the western tip of Senegal to East Africa and can occur as far south as Cameroon and is typically found in grass savannah. This Appendix II species is endangered due to habitat destruction.



Papio Hamadryas Ursinus: The Chacma ba-

boon is typically dark brown to black dorsally, with the underparts and sides of the muzzle lighter. It is found throughout much of southern Africa and is primarily water-limited. This Appendix II species is found in wooded highlands, grassland steppe and savannah habitats.



Chlorocebus Aethiops: The bodies of savannah monkeys are usually 15 to 25 inches long with tails nearly as long. They are found in Africa and west Asia and a small population is found in the Caribbean islands. These monkeys must drink daily. Hence their habitat is limited to those near constant water supplies. This Appendix II species is threatened by continuous deforestation and destruction of its habitat.



Nasalis Larvatus: The mature male long-nosed monkey is famous for its large pendulous nose that hangs down over its mouth. It is found in Brunei, Indonesia and Malaysia in either coastal mangrove forests or in lowland rainforest close to fresh-water rivers. This Appendix I species is threatened by hunting and habitat loss.

UN DIPLOMATIC POUCH-MAIL COVER MARKINGS

Much of the mail between UN offices is sent by Diplomatic Pouch. This applies to official mail, but also to personal mail, particularly personal mail from offices in the undeveloped world. From a stamp collecting viewpoint, sometimes this results in covers with no franking, either stamps or meters. However, this is not always the case, as often mail goes part way by pouch, and then is placed in the regular mail stream. Franking of such personal mail with UN stamps does provide collectors with non-philatelic use of UN stamps. Official mail which goes into the mail stream is almost always franked with a UN meter.

Covers which are sent by pouch often are given a notation by imprint, typing, or in writing. Here is a listing of typical generic pouch markings:

> POUCH BY POUCH VIA POUCH

VIA DIPLOMATIC POUCH SERVICE Some pouch imprints give us additional information. Two destination markings are as




Figure 1: 1993 cover sent from International Drug Control Programme, Pakistan to Insurance Agency in NY, UNNY meter applied, 1993, NEW YORK POUCH marking

Some covers with interesting pouch markings are shown in Figures 1 through 7. Some markings certify a cover for pouch service, as on Figures 8 and 9. A listing of mail contained in a diplomatic pouch is maintained. Thus any covers intended to be included must be registered on that list, as in Figures 10 through 11.

A future article will deal with other aspects of the UN Diplomatic Pouch Mail system. If you have something to contribute on the subject, let us know.




Figure 2: Cover sent from UN New York to UN Geneva, unfranked, UN POUCH marking.




Figure 3: UNNY CC cover to ICAO-Montreal, with UNDP POUCH marking. Whether the cover is from NY or another office is unknown. Usually pouch does not seem to be used from NY to Montreal.




Figure 7: Unfranked UNDP-Afghanistan CC cover to IAEA-Vienna, FAO POUCH marking.




Figure 8: UNTAB Djakarta (Technical Assistance Board) cover from Indonesia to ICAO-Montreal, UNNY meter, 1962




Figure 9: UNICEF-New York cover to WHO-Geneva, unfranked




Figure 10: WFP-Ethiopia cover to Insurance Company in NJ, UNNY stamps and 1995 postmark.




Figure 11: Unfranked FAO-Rome cover to UN-NY TO BE REGISTERED ON CHECK LIST.

THREE VERSIONS OF THE 2005 INTERNATIONAL PERSONALIZED SHEET

On March 3, 2005 the United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) issued a new personalized sheet (Version I) with ten stamps bearing the international airmail rate of 80¢. The five designs have been numbered by the Scott Catalogue as UNNY #880-4. These stamps had a first day of sale during the Mega-Event at Madison Square Garden in New York.




Figure 1: 2005 Personalized Error Sheet with 8×80¢ and 2×37¢ stamps and German Text. Error stamps are in 1st column (bottom stamp) and 2nd column (4th stamp from top).




Figure 2: 2005 Corrected Personalized Sheet with 10×80¢ stamps without German Text.

In the August 2005 issue of the Journal (page 4) I quoted an announcement by the UNPA that approximately fifty sheets of these sheets were sold at the show with two of the stamps (#884) bearing 37¢ denominations instead of 80¢. The error sheet (Version II) appears in Figure 1. The error stamps appear in the first column (bottom stamp) and the second column (second stamp from the bottom). Both error stamps feature the sculpture: "Sphere within a Sphere". The sheet (Version I) in Figure 2 shows the stamps as they were meant to be issued: 10×80¢ instead of 8×80¢ and 2×37¢. The images for these sheets were supplied by UNP-member Brian Reiser, who received these sheets in response to a mail order. According to the UNPA only a handful of these sheets were sold by mail.

It is interesting to note that the error sheet contains another error. In addition to the six official languages of the UN (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian, Spanish), one has mistakenly added German (Vereinte Nationen). In the corrected version of the sheet in Figure 2, the German inscription has been removed. But it appears that these two different types of errors were not noticed at the same time. Indeed on the rear mailing sheet of the April 2005 issue of the *Journal*, one can see a third version of this personalized sheet (Version III) with the corrected denominations (10×80¢) but with the Ger-

man inscription still present. This image was supplied to the editor by the UNPA. Note that this image bears a UNNY hand cancel dated October 24, 2004. This date is more than four months before the stamps were eventually released for sale and was originally the anticipated first day of sale. Brian has a mint copy of the Version III sheet without the hand cancel, which was bought at NAPEX in June 2005.

I first learned of the mistaken German inscription at the Washington 2006 in May 2006 from a German stamp dealer, who was representing the Michel Catalogue. He expected that this version of the 2005 Personalized sheet would be mentioned in the 2007 edition of the Specialized UN Michel Catalog.

In the meantime a revised version of the international personalized sheet with 10×84¢ stamps bearing the same designs was released on March 6, 2006. This sheet appears on the back cover of the June 2006 issue of the *Journal*.

In the past the Scott Catalogue has not distinguished between personalized sheets with different selvage but the same stamps. Hence the stamps in the Washington 2006 personalized sheet bearing the same 10×84¢ designs (as the 2005 international sheet), which was released on May 28, 2006, should not be given different catalogue numbers. The Washington 2006 sheet appears on the back cover of the August 2006 issue of the *Journal*.

Presumably the Scott Catalogue will not distinguish between Version I and Version III of the 2005 international personalized sheet. But it will probably have to supply a different catalogue number for the 37¢ error stamp. Volume 1 of the 2007 edition of the Scott Catalogue does not list the error.

IMF AND WORLD BANK ANNUAL MEETING

Singapore - 2006

The Boards of Governors of the World Bank Group (Bank) and the International Monetary Fund (Fund) meet once a year to discuss their work. The Annual Meetings, which generally take place in the fall, have customarily been held in Washington for two consecutive years and in another member country every third year.




Figure 2: \$1 and \$5 coin conference stamps.

In 2006, the Annual Meeting was held in Singapore, September 19-20. Singapore created a special event called Singapore 2006. In addition to the IMF-World Bank meeting, a series of lectures, forums and business events were organized. Singapore issued five stamps for the IMF-World Bank meeting. Three stamps (Figure 1) resemble currency notes in design and showcase the national flower (50¢), the Esplanade (80¢) and Singapore's skyline (\$1) respectively, and two stamps (Figure 2) have gold and silver coin designs (\$1 & \$5).

The only special cancel known so far is shown in Figure 3. This refers to Singapore 2006 and was used as the first day cancel on September 13, 2006. Whether there was a special cancel referring to IMF/World Bank is not known. Security precautions at the meeting prevented any outsiders from entering in the meeting venue, thus making documentation of postal arrangements difficult.

ICAO CONFERENCE DISCOVERY - RHODES, GREECE (1954)

There was a Special Middle East Telecommunications meeting of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) held in Rhodes, Greece May 11-31, 1954. This is listed by Gaines, on page 1419, as 1955/1. The listing number is in error, since the meeting took place in 1954, not 1955. Gaines shows a special imprint for the meeting, in Greek.




Figure 2: Navy Building in Washington - the site of the First Session of the Governing Body.

Thanks to UNP-member Albert Pelsser, retired ICAO Staff member, we now know that there were two such imprints: one in English, the other in Greek. The two imprints are shown on covers in Figures 1 and 2.

Thanks to Albert for helping to make ICAO postal history more complete.

THE EARLY DAYS OF THE ILO IN WASHINGTON

On January 25, 1919 the World War I Peace Conference at Versailles decided to appoint a Commission of fifteen members for the study of international labor legislation. It had in mind to "complete the significance of the Peace Treaty by guaranteeing the dignity and liberty of human labor by International Conventions".

In the summer of 1919 an Organizing Committee prepared for the first International Labor Conference (ILC) to be held in Washington, D.C. In October 29th the ILC opened. One of the earliest achievements was the appointing of the first Governing Body of the International Labor Organization (ILO). Figure 1 shows delegates attending the first ILC in Washington. Figure 2 shows the Navy Building, the site of the first session of the Governing Body.

During the First Session of the ILC seven Draft Conventions embodying the following main principles:

- (1) Hours of work in industry should not exceed eight per day and forty-eight per week.
- (2) Employment offices should be free and under public control.
- (3) Women should not be employed in industry or commerce for six weeks before and six weeks after childbirth, but should be paid maternity benefits.
- (4) Women should not work in industry at night.
- (5) Children under fourteen should not be employed in industry.
- (6) No one under eighteen should be employed in industry at night.

(7) White phosphorus should not be used in making matches.

After the ILC ended, the work of the ILO continued in Washington until early 1920 in anticipation of the move to new headquarters in Geneva and the Second Session, also known as the Maritime Session, which was held in June in Genoa. An article appeared in the April 2003 issue of the *Journal* (page 20) tracing the various ILO headquarters sites in Geneva.

Documenting philatelically the presence of the ILO in Washington is not easy. The Gaines catalog pictures a cover postmarked in January 1920 in Washington, bearing the corner card of the ILC at the Navy Building. Figure 3 shows a cover with the same corner card posted on a train in June 1920 which was traveling between Briançon and Gap in France to a Bank in Paris. I suspect the sender was traveling in Europe on his way to either the new ILO headquarters at the former Thudicum Institute in Geneva or the ILC in Genoa. I know of no other covers from this first ILC during the conference itself.




Figure 4: 1932 service cover from the Washington Office of the ILO to Mr. T. F. Johnson at the ILO in Geneva and then forwarded to the Nansen International Office for Refugees.

Strangely enough the USA did not officially join the ILO for more than a decade, partly as a result of the fact that it never joined the League of Nations. Figure 4 shows a 1932 ILO cover from the Washington Office.

During World War II before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, the ILC returned to Washington for its 25th Session in the fall of 1941. I have yet to find a cover documenting this last conference before the USA was forced to enter World War II.

UN-related meter and permit slogans used by commercial, philatelic and nongovernmental organizations have been tabulated to be eventually included in a UNP Monograph, The UN in USA. A sampling of this tabulation is presented with a request for additional slogan meters or meters, and additional information to that shown. A detailed listing with all meter #'s and users is available on request (by e-mail or by sending a SASE).

Meters and permits are assumed to be in red, unless indicated otherwise. The listing is in alphabetical order based on the slogan text. The information presented for each slogan is as follows: item #, slogan subject, date range observed, colors if other than red and organization using the meter or permit. Abbreviations which may not be obvious are listed below:

HR- Human Rights

UNA- UN Association

UNCIO - UN Conference on International

Organization, San Francisco, 1945

IBY - International Book Year

ICY - International Cooperation Year



U.N. Personalized Sheets

In 2003, the United Nations Postal Administration issued it's first Personalized Sheet, (Scott 855-57) which had 4 strips of 5 stamps on a sheet with an attached label. Visitors to the UN Headquarters in New York could have a picture taken and applied to the label. For their mail order customers, the UNPA printed appropriate symbols on the labels.

For the Hong Kong Stamp Expo, January 30- Feb 3, 2004, the first of the UN Personalized Show sheets was issued. The border of the sheet was changed and the official show cancel was on label. Only 1000 were issued and sold out quickly at the show. Since then, the UNPA has issued 2 Personalized Show sheets per year. The quantities have ranged between 1000 and 4000 for the Washington 2006 show.

Since the Hong Kong sheet, the UNPA has kept a quantity of the show sheets for sale by mail with the exception of the Japan Aichi 2005 Expo which ran from March 25th

September 25, 2005. This was a commissioned sheet by a UN Licensee in Japan. The sheets could not be sold outside the Expo by contract. A strict limit per customer was enforced and very few have reached the philatelic market. We are fortunate to have a small quantity of the Aichi sheets available.

Sheet #7 Japan 50th Anniversary in the UN was produced for the Japan Mission to the UN with an 84-cent stamp design that is not otherwise available from the UNPA.

Each sheet is in the same format as the original UN issued personalized stampwith special border designs and labels.

Sheets 1-3 are the stamps of 853-57, Sheet 4 is 880-84, Sheet 5-6 are 903-07, Sheet#7 is a unique design.










The 880-84 sheet was originally to be issued in March 2005 at the ASDA Mega Event. About 50 sheets were sold before a customer noticed that one value on each of the two 2 84-cent strips, (Scott #883) had actually a 37-cent denomination. The sheets were immediately removed from sale and not available until the correct sheets were printed.





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
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
