

40th ANNIVERSARY – ERADICATION OF SMALLPOX

The World Health Organization commemorated the 40th anniversary of smallpox eradication in December 2019, recognizing the historic moment on December 9, 1979 when the end of smallpox was confirmed to have been eradicated. Five months later, in May 1980, the 33rd World Health Assembly issued its official declaration that 'the world and all its peoples have won freedom from smallpox'.

A plaque marking the end of a scourge that had afflicted millions for thousands of years was unveiled at WHO headquarters in Geneva in the very same meeting room where, four decades earlier, the 19 members of the Global Commission for the Certification of Smallpox Eradication certified that smallpox had been eradicated from the world.

Until it was wiped out, smallpox had plagued humanity for at least 3000 years, killing 300 million people in the 20th century alone. The last known endemic case of smallpox was reported and the outbreak promptly contained in Somalia in 1977.

The successful smallpox eradication programme yielded vital knowledge and tools for the field of disease surveillance, the benefits of ring vaccination and the importance of health promotion in fighting diseases such as poliomyelitis and the Ebola virus. It also laid the foundation for stronger national immunization programmes worldwide, underpinning the establishment of primary health care in many countries and creating momentum toward Universal Health Coverage.

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200th BIRTH ANNIVERSARY – FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE YEAR OF THE NURSE AND THE MIDWIFE 2020 **DEFINITIVE STAMP**

The World Health Organization (WHO) declared 2020 as the International Year of the Nurse and the Midwife to recognize the critical contribution both professions make to global health. The year also marks the bicentenary of the birth of the founder of modern nursing. Florence Nightingale (1820-1910).

Florence Nightingale was born on May 12, 1820 in Florence, Italy, the city which inspired her name. She came to prominence while serving as a manager and trainer of nurses during the Crimean War, in which she organized care for wounded soldiers. While making her night rounds she

became known as "The Lady with the Lamp".

During her career, Nightingale laid the foundation for professional nursing by establishing the Nightingale Training School for Nurses at the St. Thomas' Hospital in London in 1860. Her efforts to reform healthcare greatly influenced the quality of care in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Nursing is often referred to as the caring profession. Around the world, nurses and midwives play a crucial role in health promotion, disease prevention and the delivery of care in all settings. They are often, the first and only point of health contact and care in their communities.

Nurses and midwives play a vital role in providing health services and are the largest professional group in the health care workforce, accounting for 50% of the personnel globally. Nearly 70% of the health and social workforce are women. They often work in challenging circumstances; undervalued, under-resourced and overworked.

This year-long effort to recognize nurses and midwives is a time to celebrate their work, highlight the challenging conditions they often face, and advocate for increased efforts to address the global health-care worker shortage. HELLO KITTY AND GLOBAL GOALS

On March 19, 2020, UNPA issued a set of six mini-sheets featuring Hello Kitty and the Global Goals, also known as the Sustainable Development Goals. The self-adhesive stamps are blank with several Hello Kitty elements in the tab, which can be incorporated on the stamps, creating their own personal designs.

The United Nations and Sanrio Co., Ltd. launched a strategic collaboration to promote the Sustainable Development Goals. Through the collaboration, Hello Kitty highlights six of the 17 Goals introducing them through the #HelloGlobalGoals global video series.

The six SDGs featured on the UN stamps are as follows: Goal 3 - Good Health and Well-Being; Goal 4 - Quality Education; Goal 5 – Gender Equality; Goal 11 – Sustainable Cities and Communities; Goal 13 – Climate Action; and Goal 14 - Life Below Water.

"Hello Kitty is bringing her enormous fan base to our global efforts to educate young people, in every part of our world, about the Sustainable Development Goals, and why they should be involved in achieving them." said Melissa Fleming, Under-Secretary-General for Global Communications, United Nations.

Three accordion booklets, which contain six different stamp sheets, will accompany the stamp series.

UNPA issued three accordion-style booklets to accompany the stamp series. Each booklet contains six mini-sheets of one stamp each of the same denomination (US\$ 1.20 for New York, CHF 2.00 for Geneva and € 1.80 for Vienna).



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US Delegation to UN Conference on International Organization (UNCIO) San Francisco, 1945 - Addenda 2

In an article in the October 2016 Journal, postal history, mainly incoming and outgoing mail to or from members of the US Delegation, was shown. In an Addendum in the April 2017 Journal, incoming mail to another delegate, Sol Bloom, was shown. It was noted that postal history for two delegates. Cordell Hull and Charles Eaton, had not yet been found. In the intervening years, more incoming and outgoing mail for a number of the US delegates has been found, but such mail for Hull and Eaton is still elusive. Readers are urged to report such covers if they know of them.

In the article, Cordell Hull was noted by a US stamp issued in his honor. I have finally found a philatelic note of Charles A. Eaton, as shown in Figure 1. This is a 1943 free franked cover sent by Eaton, who was a NJ congressman and member of the House Committee on Foreign Relations.




Fig. 2: Tom Connally Free Franked Cover

I looked for other US Delegates who had used free franks. Figure 2 shows a 1943 free franked cover from Tom Connally, who was Vice-Chairman of the US Delegation, Senator from Texas, and Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.




Fig. 3: Arthur H. Vandenberg Free Franked Cover

Fran Adams contributed a image of a Arthur H. Vandenberg 1947 free franked cover. Vandenberg was Senator from Michigan, becoming chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in 1947. This is shown in Figure 3.

There are other delegates who have served in the Congress or Senate (see original article). Free franked covers from them are out there to be found.

We UN collectors can enrich our collections and exhibits with interesting philatelic elements. Free franked covers are a possibility that you may

not have considered. An example is Eleanor Roosevelt, who used a free frank as a Presidential widow, and figures prominently in early United Nations history, particularly in her work on Human Rights.

Reply Post Cards to or from United Nations-NY, Part 1

Editor's Note: This is the first part of an article by Klaus Guhl on the use of Reply Post Cards to and from UN-NY.

In 1891 the Universal Postal Congress introduced the Reply Postal Card. This is a double postal card, a request card attached to a reply card. Both cards are franked with the postage of the sending country. The cards can be "postal cards" with the postage printed on the card, or "post cards", with stamps being added to pay the postage.

Editor's note: In 1892, the United States issued its first Reply Postal Card, Scott #UY1, for use within the United States. In 1893, the United States issued its second Reply Postal Card, Scott #UY2, for use internationally.

A postal agreement signed between the United Nations and the United Nations on May 28, 1951 allowed the United Nations to use its own stamps, which it did starting on October 24, 1951. The stamps and postal stationery issued had to comply with the requirements of the United States Post Office. Although UN postal cards were issued, no Reply Postal Cards have been issued.

In 1955, Arnolds Terins, a New York based UN stamp dealer, started to use a Reply Post Card he had designed to send from the UN, and receive the reply portion from elsewhere, thus getting a "legal" non -UN postmark on UN stamps.

Three different Reply Post Cards were designed for use. For No.1 and No.2, the following were printed on both the request and reply cards. For No.3, the design appears on the request card, and **"expo67 MONTREAL CANADA"** on the reply card.

Mystery. Apparently this card was uncancelled in 1958 and was mailed at UN in 1967, being accepted even though postal rate had been increased from 4c to 5c.

The recipient of the Request card was Dr. Detlef Schmidt, founder of UNOP. In the UNOP newsletter of UNOP from 1959-60, I found no reference to such correspondence with Terins, or of the resulting cancelling of UN stamps with non-UN postmarks. Some of these cards are listed in the Lindner UN Catalog, which was edited by Wolff Hanke, editor of the UNOP Newsletter. But the catalog does not explain how these cards came about.

A Philatelic Trip to the Home of the League of Nations

In October 2019, I had the opportunity to take a trip to Geneva, Switzerland and visit the Palais des Nations, current home of the United Nations Office at Geneva, and the past home of the League of Nations (Figures 1, 2). The trip afforded me a very special opportunity to review the collection of philatelic material that was formed into the UN Philatelic Museum years ago, and to see first hand the splendor of the Palais, its beautiful architecture, grounds, facilities, and artwork.

The Palais was the second and final permanent home of the League constructed from 1929 - 1938. The League took up occupancy in 1936 and construction continued for an additional two years. In 1946, at the final League Assembly meeting, the assets of the organization, including the Palais, were transferred over to the newly formed United Nations Office at Geneva. The Palais continues to serve this function today.

The Palais is situated in Ariana park along Lake Geneva. The park's land was donated to the City of Geneva by a wealthy land-owner, named Gustave Revilliod, last descendant of the Revilliod de Rive Family, with a few conditions: (1) that he, Gustave, be buried on the premises; and (2) that the park be maintained in a natural state. In addition, legend has it that Revilliod also wanted the Peacocks on the land to remain and roam freely. Remarkably all three conditions continue to be met and are even visible to park visitors (Figures 3,4,5). Those sheep, brought to the park periodically by a local herder, act as grounds groomers and natural fertilizers!!!!

Like the UN Headquarters in New York, the Palais is adorned with beautiful artwork donated by member states of the League and of the UN. Tapestries, paintings, sculptures, photography, and even beautiful clocks provided by famous Swiss watchmaker Patek Philippe, fill the halls and chambers of the

the Palais, and to this day the company still services the timepieces (Figures 6, 7). Conference rooms both large and small are filled with beautiful furniture, rugs and ornate light fixtures (Figures 8, 9, 10). Over 10,000 meetings are held at the Palais annually.

In 1962 the United Nations Philatelic Museum was created thanks to a cooperative effort between the UN and the Swiss Postal Telegraph and Telephone (PTT) Service, that granted proceeds to the UN from the sale of special stamps honoring the UN Philatelic Museum in October 1962, and stamps commemorating the Conference on Science and Technology in 1963. Figure 11 and 12 show images of the Swiss issues sold to help finance the Museums construction and initial philatelic acquisitions. Proceeds from the sales provided nearly 500,000Sfr., and a portion of the funds were used to purchase specially designed frames for the display of the material, secured space in the Palais for a permanent display, and importantly gave the UNOG an opportunity to acquire the League of Nations and International Labor Organization (ILO) collection formed by Swiss collector Charles Misteli. You may recall. Misteli wrote the seminal work on the League stamps and cancels back in 1943, Les Timbres SdN et BIT, edite par le Club Philatelic et Aeropostal de Genève, 1943. His work was translated and updated by our past editor, Dick Powers, and the club issued a monograph of this work in 1996. Misteli's collection was purchased by the UNOG and formed the basis of the Museum's collection.

Initially, the UN Philatelic Museum was located at Door 6 of the Palais and was officially inaugurated in a ceremony on October 24, 1962, United Nations Day. It was not until more than a year later, on December 10, 1963, Human Rights Day, that the Museum was officially opened to the public. The only remnant of the Museum's existence in that location is the wall display shown in Figure 13. Initially the Museum collection was housed in specially constructed frames

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that were suspended from the ceiling and pulled downward to view (Figure 14). I have never seen anything similar and s believe they must have proven troublesome because they were subsequently replaced when the Museum was relocated. Figure 15 shows the original floor plan of the Museum frames.


During my review of materials related to the Museum maintained in the UN Archives Geneva, I came across a nice 30 page pamphlet given to visitors to the museum back in 1963 (Figures 16, 17). The pamphlet outlined the collection topics and provided a nice short history of the League, ILO and International Agencies. I was also able to spend some time looking at the original correspondence between the League, ILO, and Swiss PTT regarding the development and use of stamps for these organizations and I hope to return to Geneva someday to continue to study the archival material and write about their contents..

I was invited to view a beautiful exhibition on the theme of 100 Years of Multilaterialism in Geneva developed by the UN Museum Geneva, part of the UN Library & Archives Geneva (Figure 18). My hosts for the tour were Stefan Vukotić, Chief of Archives Management Unit, UN Library & Archives Geneva, Blandine Blukacz-Louisfert, Chief of the Institutional Memory Section, UN Library & Archives Geneva, and Pierre-Etienne Bourneuf, Scientific Advisor, UN Library & Archives Geneva (Figure 19). The exhibit was full of fascinating documents, photographs, artwork and other ephemeral material that showcased international cooperation in the last century such as support for refugees, eradication of disease, and even a Nobel Peace Prize (Figures 20, 21, 22, 23).

In 1973 the then newly constructed conference center and office tower (Building E) adjacent to the Palais was completed (Figure 24). The building contained much needed conference and open space, additional staff



offices, and room for lounges, coffee shops, a souvenir and book store, and the United Nations stamp sale counter (Figure 25). A set of non-conspicuous double doors led to a meeting space that would become the home of the UN Philatelic Museum (figure 26). Just inside the doors stands the original museum plaque affixed to a wall, which notes its grand inauguration back in October 1962 (Figure 27). On the left side of the space is a massive bank of 8 safes (each with 50 vertical pull-out drawers and two massive horizontal drawers below) built for the Swiss PTT by BIGLA AG Corp., which house the collection (Figure 28). Interestingly the set of safes are numbered 3 - 10. I inquired as to what happened to safes 1 and 2 and apparently at the time the safes were procured and ready for installation, the floor below the room had to be reinforced due to the shear mass of the structures. Based on some calculated costs, it was decided not to install two of the cabinets, and their space was transformed into a countertop and storage (Figure 29)!

The Misteli Collection is housed in the upper vertical pull-out drawers of the safes. Banks 3&4 contain the League and ILO collections as well as the Permanent Court of International Justice (PCIJ/ICJ) material. Banks 5-9 contain the collections of other international agencies, UN New York, Geneva, Vienna, and a few special exhibits such as First Flights and Military Mail.

During my visit I was accompanied and supported by two members of the UNOG Staff, Lyazzat Tursynbayeva and Catherine Trevelline, from the Operations Support Unit, Central Support Services (Figure 30). Together we spent the better part of the week reviewing and inventorying the collections. (Figure 31). I was of course particularly fascinated by the League and ILO material, as I have specialized in those areas for more than 45 years. The Misteli collection was filled with beautiful service covers, including some excellent conference and specialized material such as Nansen International

Office for Refugees. One of the highlights for me was to study the ILO overprint plate varieties that Misteli had documented in his work from 1943.

Another highlight was spending time with Wilhelmina "Mini" Wezenberg, who had been an employee of the UNPA Geneva and later was in charge of the Postal Museum during the 1980s - 2000s (Figure 32). Mini was responsible for curating the collection and actually mounted the material that still resides in the safe panels. Miny was instrumental in providing some of the information on the history of the Museum that I have documented in this short article. Unfortunately, in the mid-2000's, the UNOG made a difficult decision and closed the Museum as costs for maintenance and operations continued to increase, and funding became more difficult to secure. Fortunately the material has remained intact in the safes of the Museum and the environment has preserved the collection very well.


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
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
These new books, in full color, highlight U.N. subject areas previously undocumented.



The International Peace Conference of 1899 in the Hague, Netherlands was a first step toward organized disarmament and peaceful arbitration of conflicts between countries. It was also the subject of artists and publishers depicting the people and events of the day. This guide to the commemorative postcards produced as a remembrance of the conference for visitors to the Hague, provides a glimpse into that time through the beautiful miniature artwork depicted on these postcards.



Colombia and Peru have a long history of arguing over control of the 'Department of the Amazonas'. In 1932, fighting broke out several times. To defuse the local combat. Colombia and Peru, both members of the League of Nations, agreed to binding arbitration by the League. Under supervision of the Leticia Commission, a military force policed the disputed area for 1 year. This was the earliest use of a neutral military force under international control for peacekeeping purposes. It remains the model for peacekeeping efforts even today.



The International Institute of Agriculture (IIA) was founded in 1905 by David Lubin and sponsored by King Emmanuel III of Italy. In a 1906 treaty, 40 countries formalized the Institute and it became the international clearing house for agricultural information and statistics. Based in Rome, the Institute used Italian postal services and maintained an internal post office to track mail volume and expenses. The Institute also secured special cancellation devices to use on mail from the institute.

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
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
