

The 2020 UNP Annual Meeting was held virtually at 2 PM on August 22. The meeting was very well attended, with about 25 members there. Clem talked about ECOSOC sessions held in Geneva, and showed postal history from 1948 to 1990 from the meetings. Jeffery talked about refugees from World War II and the activities of UNRRA and IRO to help them.

Shirley manned the UNPA booth at UN-EXPO17 in Bellefonte, PA, and helped ensure the show bourse was a success, and helped manage the UN First Day of Issue at the show.

Fellow Member of the UNPI Board of Directors Caroline Scannell added these words:

I met Shirley through her second husband, Les Heinzel and I met him through the Europa Study Unit. All stamp collectors. When I found she was the UN Rep for the Midwest I used to kid him that he married the stamp supply because I knew he also collected UN. Hey! He'd never miss a new issue! Since Les' demise, the last few years Shirley had been doing the shows herself so at Columbus in 2018, the last time I saw Shirley, I stood by to give her 'bathroom breaks'. She and I exchanged cards at Christmas time each year and she would tell me about her grandchildren.

Shirley's contributions to UN philately and her support of the UNPI will be remembered for years to come. We shall miss her.

UNESCO Education Program, Part 1

UNESCO's work is focused on helping to fill the world's needs in three areas: Education, Science, and Culture. In a series of articles, I plan to describe UNESCO's activities in each of these areas using postal history to illustrate those activities. I will begin with the Education Sector.

The Education Sector is the largest in UNESCO. There are currently about 120 staff working in this sector at UNESCO's headquarters in Paris, with another about 300 spread across a global network of 53 field offices and specialized institutes and centers.




Fig. 1: 1984 cover sent from Paris Headquarters to the Princeton University Library. Franked with a UNESCO meter with a slogan for "Education for All". Origin cachet "ED/STE/ENV" for Education Sector/Division of Science, Technology and Environmental Education/ Environmental Education Section

The UNESCO Education Sector has undoubtedly undergone many changes for the last 74 years. Figures 1, 2, 3, and 4 show origin cachets from some of the Sector's offices in the past. Currently, the Education Sector is composed of the Executive Office and four divisions, as follows:

- Policies and Lifelong Learning Systems
- Inclusion, Peace and Sustainable Development
- Education 2030 Support and Coordination
- Global Education Monitoring Report.




Fig. 4: Origin Cachet: "ED/EPP" ED/EPP is Education Sector/Education, Policy and Planning Division

Regional Education Offices



International Bureau of Education, Geneva

The International Bureau of Education (IBE) was a private organization created in 1925 as a non-governmental organization focused on public and private education. In 1929, it became the first intergovernmental organization dedicated to education.

In 1939, the IBE created the Service of Intellectual Assistance to Prisoners of War, cooperating with the International Committee of the Red Cross. In 1940, it started issuing BIE Labels, which were sold to provide funds for this program.

Swiss stamps for use by BIE where issued in 1944, and continue to this day.

When UNESCO was created in 1945, BIE helped to develop its education program, and collaboration continued. A joint commission was set up in 1952, and the two organizations began jointly sponsoring the International Conference on Education. Finally, in 1969, BIE became a part of UNESCO.

Today, IBE's work is defined as assisting UNESCO Member States in the areas of curriculum, learning, teaching and assessment. These are particularly applicable in the Education 2030 program and the fourth Sustainable Development Goal to "ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and to provide lifelong learning opportunities to all".

UNESCO International Institute for Educational Planning, Paris

The International Institute for Educational Planning (IIEP) is a semi-independent institution created by UNESCO in 1963. The French Government supplied a building, and initial financing was by UNESCO and the World Bank.

IIEP's mandate is to help UNESCO Member States with educational policy, planning and management. It offers training in educational planning and management. It works with Member State Education Ministries to achieve their Education 2030 Agenda.

IIEP offers on-site coaching to ministry planning departments, with the goal of making them autonomous in doing their jobs. It gives special attention to working with countries with special needs, such as handling emergencies and reconstruction.

UNESCO Institute for Lifelong Learning, Hamburg, Germany

The UNESCO Institute for Lifelong Learning (UIL) in Hamburg, Germany was originally established in 1952 as the UNESCO Institute for Education. A 1990 cover from that Institute is shown in Figure 15. The Institute is housed in a historic villa provided by the city of Hamburg. The villa, near the University of Hamburg, was built for the shipping magnate Albert Ballin (1857-1918).



The new name for the Institute is used on the 2009 meter tape in Figure 16. The name change occurred sometime in the 1990-2009 time period. UIL does research, training and publishing on literacy, non-formal education, adult and lifelong learning. Its mission is to see that all forms of education and learning - formal, non-formal and informal - are recognized, valued and available for meeting the demands of individuals and communities throughout the world. UIL responds to challenges facing humanity such as peace and democracy, sustainable development, poverty eradication, nurturing diversity, defeating HIV/AIDS and protecting the environment.

UNESCO International Centre for Technical and Vocational Education and Training, Bonn, Germany

The UNESCO International Centre for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (UNEVOC) was created in 1999, housed within the Langer Eugen Building, formerly used by German members of parliament, and now part of the UN Campus, in Bonn, Germany. The UNEVOC Network had actually been launched in 1992.






Fig. 18: 2009 Cover from UNEVOC to Forst, Germany, Meter C016339 with a different UNEVOC slogan



Four Cards have been found from 1971 in which Scott UX-4 Postal Card has been converted to an International Reply Card and mailed back to the United States with only UN postage. It is not known how these cards were sent to the four countries. The conversion was done by typing this inscription to the UX-4 Card:

UNION POSTALE UNIVERSELLE CARTE POSTALE RESPONSE REPLY-CARD

Additional UN postage was added to pay for Air Mail back to the United States.




Reply Card from Moscow, USSR, April 26, 1971




Reply Card from Milan, Italy, May 28, 1971

Conversion of Scott UX-4 Postal Card to a Reply Postal Card




Reply Card from Madrid, Spain, June 25, 1971

Fun with Forerunners No. 1

For many years I have been acquiring interesting UN commercial covers from the forerunner period (pre-1951) through the early 1950's that help document the history of the United Nations early development. I enjoy studying the covers and will through this new column, try to share some of these with our membership. Often, there is more to the story, so if you study these covers and notice something that I have not pointed out, please send me a note and I will keep a running list of updates.

I recently acquired a nice cover for my UN forerunner collection which bears a lovely US meter imprint Pitney Bowes (PB) 58650. Interestingly the imprint is an undated New York N.Y. circular imprint typical of bulk mailing with SEC. 562 P.L.&R. In the lower half (Figure 1). Some research indicated that the imprint 562 P.L. & R. (Section 562 of the Postal Laws and Regulations) was used on bulk mail between October 1, 1932 and February 25, 1949, making this a rather early UN service cover. The 1c postage paid would have been sufficient for third-class bulk rate with a minimum of at least 20 pounds or 200 identical pieces shipped at the same time. After 1949, the regulation was updated to Sec. 34.66 P.L.&R which were commonly seen on the famous UNNY 1 1/2c precancel service covers in the early to late 1950's. In fact the corner card on this early piece is the same as those seen on the earliest UN precancel mailings in 1952, so we know the UN had a supply of these covers dating back to at least 1949.

The letter was addressed to a professor of physics at a junior college in Michigan using some form of addressograph automated process, which indicates that is was probably part of a much larger mailing. I speculate the contents may have been making him aware of some recent UN publications or other materials that may have been useful to his field of study. I know Columbia University Press was one of the printers used by the UN in the early years for much of their publication and publicity mailings. This meter was assigned to an office in New York City, possibly Columbia University, but a review of the *Meter Stamp Society Oval Postage Meter Catalog*, did not reveal its origins. So we still have a mystery as to where this was posted.

I speculate that the mailer was either a third-party mail processor contracted by the UN, or possibly a UN specialized agency which may have had a small office in Manhattan at the time. Recall in 1949, the UN Headquarters was still very much under construction and the old Sperry Plant at Lake Success, Long Island, was serving as the temporary headquarters for the organization. Lake Success had several PB meter machines on site so if this were mailed from UN Headquarters it would probably bear one of the UN forerunner meter slogans. Until next time, Happy Collecting.

















Submissions should include text (Word document or equivalent) and images (preferably .jpg files) separately. New authors are welcome and assistance will be given if needed.

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
