Pictured are first days of two items of revalued UN postal stationary. UN-Geneva revalued its 70 c postal card by adding a 10 c surcharge overprint on 2 January 1986. UN-Vienna revalued its S9 aerogramme by adding a S2 surcharge overprint on 3 February 1986. No special first day cancellations were used. First days should be available at a reasonable price from dealers, unlike the revalued 4 cent air postal card of UN-New York in 1959; that first day now lists for \$135 in Gaines.








Worldwide Origin Cachets Used by the United Nations Development Programme

By B. Clement

On 14 March, UNPA issued stamps honoring the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). The UNDP, which has its headquarters in New York and field offices in over 100 countries, was established in 1965 by merging two UN organizations: the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance, set up in 1949, and the Special Fund, which was set up in 1958. UNDP is the world's largest multilateral technical assistance programme, coordinating all of the UN's

development activities.

A postal history record of the world-wide activities of UNDP can be made by noting the origin cachets used on its official mail. Below are listed UNDP origin cachets which have been observed to date, not including those for Geneva, which were included in a recent article. The writer would welcome a photocopy of additional observations.

UN Vienna Balloon Mail (V)

Varieties in the Issues of 1983

In 1983 seven Balloon Mail flights were scheduled and two balloons joined the fleet: HB-BCV and OE-KZM. Balloon D-ERGEE VII continued in use for the fifth straight year with two flights: Anthering and Gutzendorf. No technical difficulty or bad weather conditions were encountered by any of the balloons for the first time since the flights began in 1979.

The Balloon Mail statistics are as follows for the scheduled 1983 flights:



The use of FDC's continued in 1983 with stamps numbered 33 and 34 on the May flights. The Najubria 83 Exhibition cachet was applied to some of the Wolfurt cards. Many of the May flights have the Rhein-Ruhr and Ovilava Exhibition cachets. A small number of covers and cards from both October flights have the Bonn Exhibition cachet.

A new "final destination" delivery procedure began in 1983. Most, but not all, covers were returned from the Landing Site to the UNPO in Vienna. A second cancel, always as "d", was applied to any open space on the front of the cover. Normal carrier means delivered the mail. The longest time period between the Landing Site Cancel date and the "d" cancel date that I have seen was eighteen days. About 90% of the time, the interval was only five days.

Through 1983, I have not seen any Balloon covers missing a "BORDSTEMPEL", and a search of 1984 covers has not turned up any "finds" either. In 1985 one cover came into my hands without a "Bordstempel". Since Balloon Mail goes through so many hands and various steps prior to delivery it is no wonder that a cover would get by all the inspections and checks at least once.



Military Mail Notes

By Stephen Cohen

1. The DJC (Dutch Infantry Coy) said goodbye to UNIFIL after one year of service. The main body of 160 men were out by 17 October 1985, with a few men at UNIFIL head-quarters there until 7 November 1985. The DJC had special stationary (Fig. 1) which, according to Willem Put of Holland, was in limited supply because most was lost in a storm. Also, the factors of few men there, and short term period of use, should make this a hard cover to find. Note also the different box cancel, used by DJC, Veltpost 49, is "Mail not cancelled in Lebanon". This marking was used on mail from members at remote posts, such as the airport in Beirut, where there were no cancelling devices; such mail was sent to Holland, and cancelled there.

Gaines also doesn't list special markings, such as that in Fig.3. This shows that men are dying, as indicated by this French marking. Most of the time, such mail would be hand returned to the sender, who is most likely a friend or loved one.



- 3. Canada has been using test mail with UN Forces mail since 1956. Aerogrammes were used in the early days. Later covers were used. See Figs. 4, 5, and 6. The words TEST MAIL were typed on the outside. The letter inside was like the UNRRA test letters; they had all the needed information. Only a few were saved, most being discarded. Some of the letters have stamps; these go by civilian aircraft back to Canada. The Canadian post office insures this mail. Without stamps, it is official military mail and goes by Canadian military aircraft, so arrival times can vary.
- Nepal is back with UNIFIL, after two years away.

2. Internal cancels are used to cancel incoming documents, sometimes letters, and rarely on interforces mail. Fig.2 shows such a cover from Ghanbatt to the CMPO, Chief Military Personnel Officer. This is a very fancy one, well done. This is not listed in Gaines, but the value should be in the \$10 range.




5. The Finnish force, according to Putt, The advance 1982. of twelve party officers arrived on 5 November, another 66 men arrived on November, and main force 15 the arrived 8 and 10 There December. was a total of 493 with the men, headquarters at Oallwiyah. December the cancel shown in Fig.7 was put into use. Special stationary is used, similar to that used by Norway and France.



Finbatt mail using the FPO requires stamps, but mail up to 10 grams can go free, via UNIFIL Base Post Office, with the UNIFIL cancel.



6. UNIFIL UNBPO is used for mail going to other than home countries, and stamps must be used, since it is not free mail. Fig. 8 shows two post cards from the Irishbatt, to England, which is not free mail. The top card is correct; the bottom, incorrect. This shows they get confused also. The French, who man the BPO, no longer have registered mail or handle parcels. Another example is shown in Fig. 9, which is an aerogramme from NorBatt, sent to Ghana, which is allowed. This correspondence resulted from

the Ghana and Norway battalions working together and forming friendships.

7. Fig. 10 shows a cover sent to Nigeria. To avoid postage due, the words LAGOS NIGERIA were stamped on. The bulk of mail from UNIFIL was sent by aerogramme and went free. To avoid this problem with letters, which were rarely sent, this method was devised.

United Nations-Related Meters from the USA

By Hans H. v. Renesse*

Collectors highly prize items related to the United Nations. One type of such material of particular interest is privately used United Nations-related meters. In Germany such meters are well-known and catalogued. But naturally they exist in other countries too, for example in the United States. As far as I know, no one has yet attempted such a corresponding systematic study for American meters. I hope to show by the following article concerning the United Nations-related meters with which I am familiar, that it would be worth the effort. In the following, I have not included the meters from meetings of United Nations-related organizations, for example, the 11th or the 22nd World Health Assembly. Often I have available only deliberately produced "favor" meter impressions. Usage on normal (non-philatelic) mail seems to be quite rare. The meters seem, in my opinion, to be strongly "philatelically inspired".

The familiar meter PB 500748, which indicates a philatelic exhibition of the United Nations, is philatelically inspired in two regards. (Color red; see Lindner, page 263).





Inspiring and particularly spectacular (and easy to insert): a meter slogan honoring the issuance of the first UNPA stamps in Geneva on 4 October 1969. It was used by the prominent UN dealer Stanley Frankel. Known dates of use are 3 June, 4 June, and 5 June in 1969. We picture this meter PB 543742 above and one of the letters sent at that time below. Unfortunately the meter was printed with a light blue ink and thus is difficult to read.

For the United Nations meter collector the firm Pitney-Bowes is, of course, familiar. It produces not only meter machines for the United Nations itself, but also makes available UN-related slogan dies for private use. To the latter belongs the slogan "THE UNITED NATIONS - YOUR HOPE FOR PEACE", which I have found assigned to the following meter machines:







Another standard slogan of Pitney-Bowes can be documented: "UN - WE BELIEVE" declared a second slogan die, which "P.B." offered. Known dates of use run from 1959 to 1962 and again (or still) in 1968. Below is a illustration of correspondence with PB 616333 to the International Labor Organization.

Apparently the slogan die wandered around from place to place. Among three of the four above pictured meters can be found a defective printing of the UN emblem on the lower left side. This must be the same slogan die. But I do not know how many of these dies were prepared.





Besides these two standard dies there are numerous other UN-related meters from the USA. I can show about a dozen. Next on this page is the slogan die "JOIN UNA - USA" used with meter PB 824973 in New York, NY with violet ink. "UNA" stands perhaps for "United Nations Associations" and could be a call for membership in the Association for the United Nations in the USA. But then does "A.A.U.N." mean the "American Association for the United Nations"? Then the call "SUPPORT THE A.A.U.N. and The U.N." used by meter machine PB 325124 in New York, NY in red ink in the accompanying figure would make the World Federation of United Nations Associations (WFUNA) happy. This meter was used by the "Speaker Services for the United Nations", which cannot be abbreviated to "A.A.U.N."



Two additional meters were used with the call to "SUPPORT the United Nations" on machines CC 7550 and CC 8794 in blue ink by the IBM Corporation in New York, NY.









Two groups used meter machine PB 170684 (red) in New York, NY: the "Conference of Consultative Non-Governmental Organizations" and the "Carnegie Endowment for International Peace". Two slogans have been observed and are illustrated below. The slogan with the text "KNOW YOUR UNITED NATIONS" appeared previously in the years 1952 and 1953.









The UN Collector group in Chicago (UNCC) celebrated the 30th anniversary of the UN in 1975 with the red meter PB 1178725.



Before the meters honoring the United Nations, as it exists today, there were also meters referring to the Allied forces in World War II as the "United Nations". As a "transitional item", one could include the







meter used in San Francisco in 1945. Actually the meters from January 1943, which announce "UNITED NATIONS WEEK" are only "United Nations"-related. An announcement by "United Nations"-related. An announcement by the "War Activities Committee" of the Film industry appeared in the New York Times on 1 January 1943 that a "United Nations Week" would be held throughout the land in support of the "United Nations" accords. Radio, Film and Theater participated and made available their meters for use with special slogans. Thus the first philatelic items with the words "United Nations" came into being. The following meters are known: following meters are known:








The user of the fourth illustrated meter is unknown.

Paramount Theaters Service Corp. (Times Square, New York, NY) also used the slogan. No illustration is available.

The meter which was used in 1943 by the "United Nations Information Office" with the famous slogan "In War and Peace-UNITED NATIONS" can be considered a "transitional item" since the machine, PB 108314, was later transferred to the United Nations.

Two Printings of #249 in Ten Months!

Collectors who were in no hurry to purchase the fourth printing of 249, the current 2 c definitive, will probably have to do without. One million of these stamps were placed on sale at the very end of January 1985. By all previous sales figures, this printing should have lasted a couple of years at least. It received heavy use, of course, in the few months before the release of the 22 c stamp on 10 May 1985, but there was also the 1 c stamp to help out as well. This writer purchased a sheet and a half at the counter late in February and did not plan to buy more until a year later, to check for possible ink, paper and gum varieties.

Instead, UNPA released the fifth printing 4 November 1985, in a quantity of 500,000. No, the stamps of the fourth printing did not get used up. Rather, they proved to be unusable. It seems that the gum was of poor quality, bringing complaints from users, including, no doubt, UNPA staff members themselves. This writer noticed a problem trying to affix one of these stamps to a postcard, but thought maybe the problem was his for not moistening the gum sufficiently.

No matter. 249.4 is history. Enter 249.5.

The latest printing is glossy, like the third and fourth. This time the gum is somewhat shiny, like the third, but with a bluish cast. In UV light the latest printing is hibrite white compared to the blue-gray high fluorescence of the third. In ordinary light the paper is whiter than the third and fourth also.

If you want this printing, don't delay. None of the later definitives has had a sixth printing.


A Study of Control Numbers and Plate Numbers of UNNY Stamps: Epilogue



This is an update of the two part article "A Study of Control Numbers and Plate Numbers of UNNY Stamps", which appeared in the October and December 1985 issues of the Journal. I received a kind note from John Terins a few days after the second installment appeared. He reminded me that I neglected to mention the 15-cent ICY issue, Scott # 144. According to Mr. Terins, "a full miscut sheet was found with the "l" in the upper right-hand corner. Since this sheet was purchased by me from the UNPA and the fact that the sheet was miscut and since the "l" is in the same red as the color of the stamp, there is no question of its authenticity". Mr. Terins went on to point out that a reinforced picture of this item can be found on page 71 of the Terins UN catalog.

I was aware that such an item had been reported in the Gaines and Lindner catalogs but had never seen a photograph. I appreciate Mr. Terins filling me in on the background of this "plate number", which could conceivably be unique for this issue.
